EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL MEETING-CONGREGATION TEMPLE SHOLOM-APRIL 23, 1979

President David Huberman in the chair. Forty-five members in attendance.

Moved by Arthur Guttman, seconded by Howard Nemtin that:


To restructure the finances of Temple Sholom by, among other things:

- a) Re-mortgaging the Temple's building located at 4426 West 10th Avenue, Vancouver, B.C. for an amount of \$100,000 (such sum to comprise the existing mortgage debt plus the Temple's current accumulated deficit of approximately \$38,000), repayable over the next five years;
- Requiring each member to participate in a five year programme to pay off the Temple's accumulated deficit, as of this date;
- c) Requiring each member to pay (over so many years as is required) a minimum of \$1,500 to the Temple's Building Fund, with full credit being given towards such commitment for any monies paid to date in this regard by each member of the Congregation. Question: 43 for; 2 against. Passed.

Moved by Arthur Guttman, seconded by Howard Shapero that:
To authorize by extraordinary (special)resolution the granting by
Temple Sholom of a mortgage for \$100,000 to such lender as may be
approved by the Board of Directors of the Temple and upon such terms
and conditions as may be negotiated by the Executive Committee and
recommended to the Board of Directors provided the mortgage include
provision for prepayment at anytime without penalty; and as a goal
it be for a term of five years; and that any monies received not be
applied or used for operating purposes without a motion approved by
the membership.

Question: 45 for. Passed unanimously.

SHAVUOT

Why read the Book of Ruth on Shavuot?

Ruth is one of the five "scrolls" or "megillot" read on special holidays during the Jewish year. Ruth is particularly appropriate for **Shavuot** for a number of reasons.

Let's review the story. After a series of painful family tragedies, Ruth journeys with her mother-in-law Naomi and her sister-in-law Orpah on the road back to Naomi's homeland in Judah. Realizing that Ruth and Orpah will have difficulty in adjusting to life in Judah, Naomi urges them to remain in Moab, their birthplace. Orpah turns back, but Ruth refuses, uttering some of the most beautiful words in all of Jewish literature: "Entreat me not to leave thee and to return from following after thee; for whither thou goest, I will go; and where thou lodgest, I will lodge; thy people shall be my people and thy God my God."

Later commentators note that this speech was not only an expression of loyalty and devotion but also a formal act of conversion to Judaism! Surprised? It's



true. Ruth was not Jewish. In the future, when we examine biblical stories, we will see how this book became one of the most powerful Jewish affirmations of the equality of converts within the Jewish community.

Ruth continues with Naomi, settles with her, and cares for her, going out to the fields each day to gather that part of the harvest left for the poor in accordance with Jewish law. The field is owned by a man named Boaz, a distant relative of Naomi. He falls in love with Ruth and marries her. Their child, Obed, becomes the father of Jesse, the father of David. The loyal convert Ruth, then, is recorded as the great-grandmother of David, king of Israel.

Three reasons, therefore, are offered as explanations for reading Ruth on **Shavuot**. First, and most obviously, the story takes place during the summer harvest. Second, say the rabbis, the book reminds us of our responsibility to Judaism. If Ruth, a convert, could be so committed to Judaism in spite of many obstacles, we too can find a continual source of blessing in our tradition. Finally, say some scholars, we read the Book of Ruth because it reminds us of the great King David.

When do we celebrate Shavuot?

Shavuot falls on the sixth and seventh days of the Hebrew month of Sivan, corresponding to May or June of the secular calendar. Orthodox and Conservative Jews celebrate two days of the holiday, while most Reform Jews observe one day.

When did Shavuot, as we know it today, begin to emerge?

Sometime after the destruction of the Second Temple. The Mishnah refers to Shavuot as "Zeman Metas Toratoru." the "Time of the Giving of the Law." By that period in history, it was already customary on Shavuot to read, as we do today, the section of the Torah containing the Ten Commandments—as well as the biblical Book of Ruth.

INCREASE YOUR JEWISH WORDPOWER...

One of the high-frequency words in the Jewish lexicon is CHESED, which means "kindness, goodness, grace, affection, love, benevolence" all rolled into one word. Perhaps the best translation is the old-fashioned but still luminous English word, "loving-kindness".

On the foundation of CHESED we build the concept of GEMILUT CHASADIM, "acts or deeds of lovingkindness". These are personal acts of goodness performed unselfishly, wholly out of kindness. In practising GEMILUT CHASADIM, we have no expectation of either gratitude or repayment. Among the acts regarded as GEMILUT CHASADIM are visiting the sick, comforting mourners, burying the dead (who certainly cannot repay us!), and generally helping others.

The Mishnah includes "acts of lovingkindness" among those things for which "no limit is prescribed". In giving financial help, for instance, our generosity need not exceed a fifth of our possessions. But practising lovingkindness knows no limits. Further, anyone can perform GEMILUT CHAS ADIM—the young, the old, the rich, the poor, the humble and the

GREAT PERSONALITIES IN JEWISH HISTORY

Shalom Aleichem ("peace be unto you") was used as the pen name for one of the most popular Jewish writers of all time — Shalom Rabinovitz. Born in 1859 in the Ukraine, his tales and sketches in Yiddish depicted with humor and pathos the contemporary life of the Jews in the Pale of Settlement.

Rabinovitz took his pseudonym to disguise his identity from his father — a prominent figure in the Enlightenment who loved Hebrew but despised Yiddish. Through his life he experienced sharp reversals of fortune. He made two trips to the United States hoping for better luck, and it was here that he died in 1916.

Shalom Aleichem had great admiration for Charles Dickens, and like the Englishman, he created a galaxy of remarkable characters whose adventures appeared in instalments over a number of years. The stories of Tevye the Dairyman span a period of twenty years; the ups and downs of Menachem Mendel, the ever-hopeful small speculator who never gets rich, with his caustic and common-sense wife, Sheine Shendel, were spread over a similar period. It is realized that under the guise of comedy, Shalom Aleichem accurately reflected the hardship and the tragedy of Russian-Jewish existence, together with the unbroken spirit and sheer talent for survival of his people.



CAMPAIGN FOR REFORM JUDAISM IN ISRAEL: \$5.00 PER FAMILY....

Despite major gains made by the Reform Movement within the World Zionist Organization, our institutions in Israel continue to receive little or no funding from the Israeli Government. Even though we are confident that this problem will be over-

come in time, we must continue to be aware that until that happy day, we, in North America, remain the only reliable source of support for our friends in Israel.

Since 1967, more than \$1 million have been raised through the \$5 per Family Campaign. These funds have been essential in developing:

Congregations. There are now thirteen Reform (Progressive) congregations in cities and towns throughout Israel. These serve large cities (Jerusalem, Tel Aviv and Haifa), suburban areas (Ramat Gan, Ramat ha-Sharon, Ramat Aviv, Kiryat Ono) and smaller towns (Netanya, Nahariya, Rishon le-Tzion, Upper Nazaret, Beer Sheva).

Youth Movement. Consistent with the pattern of Israeli life, we have established a National Youth Movement for Israelis between the ages of 13 and 23.

<u>Kibbutz Yahel</u>. Israeli government and Jewish Agency funds provide the housing, agricultural and industrial installations which make Yahel a Kibbutz. We must supply the human and material resources to make Yahel a Reform Jewish kibbutz.

The Leo Baeck School, Haifa. Now serving more than 1000 high school and junior high students, the school continues to be a major factor in building a Reform Jewish future in Israel.

Israeli Rabbinical Program. A qualified Israeli-born and Israeli-trained rabbinate is essential for the future.

Rights, Recognition and Financial Support: Where We Stand. There has been some progress. Kibbutz Yahel and the Leo Baeck School do receive government and Jewish Agency funds, but only for items of a "general" nature. Programs specifically oriented toward Reform Judaism receive no funds. Our congregations, similarly, rely entirely on the support of their members, and Reform Jews throughout the world.

Ultimate victory in this continuing struggle depends, in large measure, on building a strong Israel Movement. At present, financial responsibility remains with those of us in North America who are sensitive to the situation.
